POD DONATES BASKETS FOR BRENNEN ROWE

July 24 - Middleburg, VA. Brennen Ocean Rowe is a 4 year-old boy who collects cars, likes bacon and enjoys teasing his older sister. He also has a rare form of brain cancer with a 60% survival rate.

When Brennen's mom, Robinette Todd, was given this devasting news last February, her immediate response was, "No, he doesn't have cancer because he's a healthy boy, and he's three, and he's going to be four in six days. And you're wrong." Unfortunately, the doctors were not wrong. Brennen was diagnosed with Grade 3 Anaplastic Ependymoma. Treatment combines surgery with Proton Radiation treatments that are offered at only nine centers nationwide. Although potentially life-saving, the treatment side effects can include blindness, deafness, left side paralysis and mental retardation.

Since that seminal February day, Robinette, Brennen and family have faced the reality of dealing with Brennen's disease and treatment with a mixture of faith and hope. While they "live every day on eggshells," a number of local organizations and individuals have done what they can to help and show support for Brennen. POD participated in a July 24 fundraiser with the donation of two baskets, an Instant Tropical Party for All Ages and a Pamper Yourself Spa Kit. Special thanks go to Carol Buckingham, the Wilsheres and the Smiths for donating special items for the baskets. Robinette reports that the POD baskets were among the most popular in their raffle and she thanks all the members for the donation.

In the week before the fundraiser, Robinette lost her job, and all her medical benefits, making the community contributions that much more significant. So the family faces a difficult and uncertain road ahead. They can only be sure that Brennen has many more hospital vists to come. And after each one, he will pick out a new toy car.







September 1 - Bristow, VA. This year's Jimmy Buffett "Welcome to Finland 2011" concert stop in Bristow, VA was full of controversy! Live Nation began strictly enforcing its "no tailgating" policy at Jiffy Lube Live <u>after</u> tickets went on sale. That ruffled the feathers of many a loyal Parrothead. Jimmy Buffett himself was quoted in USA Today as saying, "Who's stupid idea was that?" Even Mother Nature was mad! Just days after an earthquake, Hurricane Irene threatened the entire east coast and postponed the show from Saturday, August 27 to Thursday, September 1. Of course, Parrotheads had been loudly protesting the price of the tickets and the new tailgating policy for months on blogs and Facebook; so this meant they could turn in their tickets for refunds. I heard that 10,000 people did just that.

Jimmy has played at the Bristow amphitheater annually since 1995 (my very first Buffett show). I've been there almost every single year. So I was personally torn on whether to turn my tickets in, or go see the show. When show time rolled around we decided it would probably be the end of an era and we didn't want to miss it. So we hurried home from work, changed into comfortable clothes, and ran off to what would be the strangest Buffett concert experience that I have EVER had.

Since we couldn't tailgate, the Skipper and I met Vince and Sue Miller for dinner at Marlin and Rays in Manassas and kicked off our own mini pre-concert party at the bar. They definitely helped us get in the party spirit, then gave us a big hug and sent us off to the show (they were heading to a long weekend of partying at VA Tech). It's a good thing we had that little pre-show boost, because this writer has to agree with Jack LaMay who described the show this way, "Getting in and out of JLL was like being in the 15 ITEMS OR LESS line at my Safeway! We weren't sure if the line to get in was for Jimmy's show or a Thursday night church supper! Except for the concert itself, there was a very disappointing lack of anticipation, atmosphere and 'parteee' attitude." I've NEVER seen anything like it in my 20+ Jimmy shows all up and down the east coast! We were able to park right next to the gate. NO ONE decorated their cars. There was no pop-up tent city. No one was dressed to the nines in their grass skirts and coconut bras; and the few tropical shirts that were around just didn't seem as loud as usual. Diane Wilshere's Facebook post said it all, "This is the most surreal Buffett concert I have ever attended. No tailgating, won't let you sit in car, making people pour out bottled water into cup at gate — at Jiffy Lube Live." There wasn't even a line for the ladies' restroom (which was probably the biggest benefit of the night!) Concession lines were non-existent as well, because no one wanted to give the venue any more money than they already had. However, even with the empty lines, it still took forever to get any service (I had to have water after all that fun at Marlin and Ray's!)

Things were looking pretty glum; but when Jimmy took the stage, all my worries floated away in typical Margaritaville fashion. The Wilsheres, the Styers and Captain Jack all sang and danced the night away with us (there was plenty of room for dancing and swaying since the venue was empty). There was no intermission; the band played straight through the night. I managed to be home and in bed by 11:00. But I was very glad that I had decided to go. This one particular show felt pretty old school, and more like the very first show I saw at this venue. To me it seemed like the perfect bittersweet ending to a pretty decent run at the ol' Nissan Pavilion for Jimmy. Guess only time will tell what will happen next year. Maybe the venue will realize their mistake and the party planning will begin again. Or maybe the club should consider a group phlocking to another location...
